The ABSP has voted to adopt the set of rules established by WESPA, as these rules will be in use at all tournaments from 1<sup>st</sup> January 2011 they will also be used within the league from that date but I would hope that during 2011 some charitable flexibility will be employed if players err.

The match programme was finished well on time and Southampton Saints won the playoffs against the Ryde Hornets, the Central Division winners and Carshalton Curlews, the Eastern Division winners. Congratulations to the Saints on their sixth consecutive win.

It was very pleasing this year that all teams completed their matches.

**It is very important that we don't loose any more teams otherwise the future of the League could be in peril.** The League is a valuable asset to the Scrabble scene in the South, not only providing competitive but also providing social outings with likeminded people. The aim is to gain one or two teams, so try to recruit your friends.

It seems to be a difficult time for clubs in general with falling membership and less willingness to travel, but once lost a league would be very difficult to restart.

The amendment to the rules allowing a player to play once for a second team has been sparingly used and has provided a worthwhile flexibility when there is a shortage of players.

## SCRABBLE NEWS ROUND UP

### **WESPA Dictionary Committee**

A new word list is being compiled and the intended implementation date is quarter two 2011, all seems to be on target.

**WESPA RULES:** These have been adopted at the AGM and will come into use on 1<sup>st</sup> January 2011. The most draconian is what happens if you accidentally end up with more than 7 tiles on your rack – you must show all to your opponent and let them choose which one goes back into the bag! So take care. Full details have been sent to ABSP members. I am sure we will all get used to the changes, and be more careful in counting tiles.

**Re-Jig of the Rating system:** The proposals put forward at the AGM have been adopted, instead of ratings being based on a history of 100 games they will now be calculated using players last 150 games.

**Self-Adjudication at Tournaments...still** much ongoing discussion, although not suitable for all venues. There has been a case of the dictionary being changed on a machine during the day so that a valid word was flagged as wrong! So if using this system check the Collins list is current.

## ADJUDICATION IN LEAGUE MATCHES

An increasing number of people are using hand-helds for adjudication and it is important to make sure that the screens can be read, this is particularly important on sunny days. The owner of the machine must be prepared to let the challenger hold his machine if this is necessary to read it.

It causes bad feelings if when a player gets home they discover a challenge was miscalled. It is everyone's right to rechallenge and if they wish they may demand a book be used for the recheck. A book should always be available during a match.

No one has yet to show there is any discrepancy between the book word list and that on a hand-held but be aware that hand-helds are equipped with a variety of dictionaries so make sure the correct one is active.
